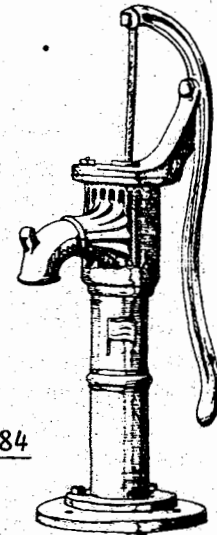

The St. Conygar Singers treated us to a musical feast at the Carol Service on 1st January and there was also a joyful rendering of 'Away in a Manger' by the children.

### NIGHTINGALE VALLEY W.I.

Nightingale Valley W.I. meet at the Village Hall on the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 7.45 p.m. This can be regarded very much as a village activity since 90% of the membership lives in Weston-in-Gordano.

At most meetings there is a guest speaker. A wide range of subjects are covered, recent examples being talks on Oberammergau, Keep Fit, the Social Services, Vitamins and Buttons. At the January meeting Mr. J. Williams promises to give an entertaining talk on Ice Cream and future subjects

will include 'A Trip to Egypt' (February) and Libraries (March).

At the December meeting, immediately before Christmas, members were entertained with a 'no-expense-spared' production of Snow White and the Four (or arguably five) Dwarfs.

New members are welcome at any time. Although the Institute is quite small in size, the atmosphere is warm and friendly.

### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Since the elections in May, the Parish Council have dealt with a wide range of issues, and certainly far more than could be included in this short account. Three items stand out as being of major importance.

#### Road Improvement Scheme

Following representations made at the Annual Parish Assembly on 28th March, the Council have pressed Avon County Council to agree to the restricted scheme which villagers appeared to want. This principally comprised the provision of a footpath on the north side of the B3124, otherwise leaving the road much as it is.

Great difficulty was experienced at first in even obtaining a reply from Avon to letters sent, but with the help of our M.P., Paul Dean, progress has been made. The County Council have now agreed to include the scheme in the programme of minor improvements for 1986/87.

#### Street Lighting.

The first phase of the conversion scheme has now been completed, with three sodium lamps replacing the old tungsten units in the narrowest part of the village street. Although the conversion costs have to be borne out of Parish rates, the County Council assume responsibility for all running costs of the new lamps as the conversions are carried out. This will mean a very considerable improvement in Parish finances as the scheme progresses. In addition the new lamps are much brighter.

#### New Refuse Tipping Licence Application

Strong objections were raised by villagers following the news of the application for a tipping licence on plot no. 199, which adjoins Mr. Fowler's existing tip on plot 186. The Council has

taken the matter up with Avon County Council, and we are opposing the issue of a new licence. There has been a long history of complaints of smells, vermin, flies and other hazards originating from the present tip, and in addition it is considered that Cadbury Lane is quite unsuitable as an access for heavy lorries.

Correspondence with the County Council was followed by a site meeting in early January at which the whole subject of tipping in the valley was discussed. This discussion included the existing tip on plot 186 and other earlier sites which are no longer used.

The question of the licence application will be considered by the Public Protection Committee of Avon C.C. at its meeting in March. Parishioners who wish to do so may make written representations direct to the chief executive at Avon House North, or to our local County Councillor, Robert Edwards, Nailsea 853175

### OTHER EVENTS
