

## PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

At the inaugural meeting of the new Council, Councillor Bill Williams was elected Chairman, and Councillor Jim Sulley Vice-Chairman.

## B3124 Road Improvement Scheme

News has been received that the Departments of the Environment and Transport have requested additional Compulsory Purchase proceedings to acquire an extra area of land for the Road Improvement Scheme. The Council are awaiting enlightenment from Avon County Council as to which piece of land is involved but it seems likely that, at best, further delay may ensue.

## Tipping in the Gordano Valley

A meeting has been held with senior officers of the Planning, Waste Disposal and Trading Standards departments of Avon County. The topic of tipping in the Valley was discussed in all its aspects, but Councillors were left with little optimism for an early end to tipping.

The Chief Executives of Avon and Woodspring Councils are currently in communication in an attempt to alleviate conditions in the Valley, and the Parish Council are continuing to monitor events and to take prompt action in respect of any alleged breaches of licence conditions.

Parishioners sometimes write to the senior Councils direct with their complaints about the tips, and this is of course quite proper. It is helpful if the Parish Council could be provided with copies of such complaints, as these can be added to the body of evidence about tipping conditions which the Council has at its disposal. The archive is now quite large!

## Best Kept Village Competition

Weston-in-Gordano has reached the final of this competition, and judging is in progress at the time of writing.

## Old Village School

The Planning and Conservation Department of Woodspring Council have agreed to the proposal to acquire this property by Compulsory Purchase, in order to prevent further deterioration.

## Notice Board

A new enlarged parish notice board has been provided outside the White Hart. The board was made by a parishioner, and half the cost is to be met by a grant from Woodspring.

## SOCIAL COMMITTEE - ACTIVITY GROUP

At the risk of repeating myself, yet again, I am pleased to report that our Activity Group has continued to be well occupied over the last few months. In conjunction with the Church Flower Festival we managed to submit a small display in the exhibition held in the village hall with some examples of our recent activities. These included pottery and collage work. On other Group nights, by kind permission of the Lewis household, we have spent some good evenings playing volley ball in the paddock with ingenious improvisation using jump supports and good encouragement from a fascinated four-legged friend!

The highlight of it all was a marvellous weekend 'camp' in which thirty adults and children indulged in a great variety of activities. Many of these activities had not been attempted before, and possibly in some adults' views, not to be ever attempted again. This all took place at Mill Farm near Bridgwater, where we rented dormitory accommodation for the duration. We descended upon it on Friday evening. Supper was served, what an error - pasties and BAKED BEANS - luckily it was a mild night and the ventilation could be used to its fullest capacity! Males were separated from females in the sleeping department and the female 'dorm' was strongly accused of keeping the male 'dorm' awake until all hours - now would we, I ask you? Saturday saw nearly all the party on horseback at some stage, which produced rare sights indeed, but a great time was had by all. We were also able to use the dinghies and the canoes throughout our time there which kept us all amused for hours on end. Other activities included volley ball, rounders, table-tennis, badminton and trivial pursuit, interspersed by the provision of food, including a fantastic barbecue, by our very able committee and helpers, many, many thanks to them all.

## VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

With our four new Trustees now appointed and the revised Trust Deed soon to be finalised, it should not be too long before application can be made to the Charity Commissioners for recognition as a registered Charity, and so come into line with the majority of Village Halls.

Usage of the Village Hall continues to increase with a wider variety of activities being held there. On some occasions - such as a Barn Dance, it is obvious that space is extremely restricted, even though the capacity under the Licensing Regulations is never exceeded.

The Committee is looking to the future, considering possible improvements and even extension, though these are early days. If this were a sort of Mills & Boon romance, some wealthy, generous ... and needless to say good-looking benefactor would come to live in the village and ere long, a spacious, well-equipped Village Hall would result! However in real-life

#### ALL OUR OWN WORK

The display of villagers' Art, Craft and Hobbies work which was mounted in the Village Hall during the three days of the recent Church Flower Festival proved to be a great success, and thanks are due to all those who allowed their work to be included.

The rear wall of the Hall - for pictures and the like - plus two trestle tables were allocated initially, but these areas soon proved to be far too small to cope with the number of exhibits. Three more tables and parts of the side walls were needed in addition. Something like 17 different areas of Art/Craft work were represented and greatly admired by visitors who made very favourable comments about "this talented village".

On Friday 5th June the Treasure Hunt organised by Mr. and Mrs Instone took place - midst a deluge of rain and strong winds and glowering skies!! In spite of this 17 cars took part and "eventually" the first bedraggled car load returned from a trip via Portishead, Clapton-in-Gordano and Nailsea etc. Mr. & Mrs Simons and family followed by the Redway family were the winners, all clutching the necessary bags of lolly sticks, dandelion clocks etc. An excellent BBQ was produced from under a dripping tarpaulin by Mr. Instone, assistants and the usual W-i-G catering team. An amazingly successful evening which made £65 for the Church.

On Friday 12th June Mr. and Mrs Hawken gave a Wine & Nibbles party at White House Farm. Mrs Hawken's family have lived at this old farmhouse for 400 years. The wine (made by Sybil's father, the late Sam Spriggs) was an experience and the nibbles were something special too. This was an enjoyable evening and £90 was raised towards the Church Summer Fete Draw.

The Church Flower Festival took place on Sat/Sunday w/e 27th June. "All Glory Laud and Honour" was the theme. Mr. Jeremy Carrad opened the Festival with an amusing summary

of Church Fete 'Openings' and expressed his especial pleasure at this occasion. Many many people visited the Church, some more than once, bringing friends and visitors. There are some excellent photographs around in the village to reveal how really beautiful and appropriate the arrangements were.

There are too many contributors to name but great credit is due to our adviser Mrs Fowles who encouraged and inspired all to produce such a special result. Also popular was the catering by Mrs Jacobs and her team; again second and even third visits for meals and strawberry cream teas. These were all enjoyed in the Village Hall where there was an Arts and Crafts Exhibition, organised by Mr. Alexander, assisted by Mr. Redway.

On the Saturday evening there was a Concert in the Church. Mr. Carrad and Mrs Staley gave Readings, Mrs Carrad a piano forte recital and Iris and Simon Haigh entertained us with some folk songs. Mrs Carrad also accompanied Judith Wilson, an accomplished young flautist. All these performers live in the village. Visiting performers were Nailsea Handbell Ringers and Judith Bright and Friends representing Clevedon Light Opera Company. In the interval many enjoyed a buffet and wine (especially nice in the Churchyard overlooking the Valley).
