

#### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

LOCAL PLAN: The Council are currently considering the Consultation Draft of the Clevedon, Nailsea and Portishead Area Local Plan, which represents planning policy for the period up to 1996.

The aspect of this plan most relevant to our village is the proposal to do away with the "Village Fence", which is also proposed for Walton-in-Gordano. At the July meeting, a planning officer from Woodspring District Council attended and explained to the Parish Council the significance of the proposal.

As the South West Avon Green Belt is now backed by statute, and "washes over" the entire village, the removal of the fence would put the village in the same position as any of the surrounding farm land so far as planning permissions are concerned; that is, there would no longer be an argument in favour of "infilling" within the village.

A public meeting will be held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 11th. November at which a planning officer will again

be present to explain and answer questions. Villagers are urged to attend to discuss this important change, as well as the other proposals in the plan. In this connection, it is worth noting that the Weston-in-Gordano bypass scheme has had another public airing recently!

As well as attending the public meeting, villagers may wish to make their views known to the planning department at Woodspring, either by writing to them direct, or by way of any Parish Councillor. The Parish Council will be making its own submission.

The plan will be available for inspection at the Public Library in Portishead in October, and the closing date for representations is December 1st.

FOOTPATH TO NATURE RESERVE: The Parish Council is trying to establish the existence of a public footpath from Cadbury Grove past the tips to the nature reserve. In order to achieve this, evidence is required that the path has been used by the public over a period of years. Anyone who has used this path can obtain an evidence form from the Clerk to the Council, or from any Parish Councillor.

TIPPING: A further meeting has been held with officers of Avon County Council, and while little positive help has been offered, the relevant Departments have been made aware that there will be no let-up in the effort to bring about an end to tipping in the valley.

LITTER: The attention of the Council has been brought to a recent increase in litter in the village, mainly consisting of sweet-wrappings, soft-drink cans and similar items. The Council does not admit to "ageist" sympathies, but nonetheless feels that parents might mention this problem to their offspring. And to think we came second in the Best Kept Village Competition!

MEETINGS: The next meeting will be on ~~Wednesday 21st.~~ October, at 7.30 pm. Please note that this is an alteration from the previously advertised date.

As usual, time will be set aside for comments and questions from the public at the start of the meeting.

Please also make a note of the public meeting on the Local Plan - Wednesday 11th. November.
