

Comings and Goings - Congratulations to the proud parents on the following new additions to the village:-




James Lewis, born January 12th 1988, a son for Sharon and Nick Phippen.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

B3124 Road Improvement Scheme. Parishioners will have seen the legal notices which have recently been published in local newspapers in pursuit of the necessary land acquis-

ition procedures. The Parish Council are not happy about the length of time which the County Council are taking to process the Compulsory Purchase Orders, and are pressing for a more satisfactory rate of progress.

Black Rock Quarry. Councillors are concerned at the lack of consultation over the proposal to move the Albert Road "skips" to the quarry site in Valley Road. The plan was published in the newspapers before the Parish Council had even heard of it.

The Parish Council are opposed to the scheme, mainly because there is already a fly-tipping problem in Valley Road, and this is bound to be much worse if people bring rubbish to the site at times when it is closed. This view has been strongly represented to both the District Council and the Public Protection Committee of Avon.

Common Land Management. A meeting has been held at which the management of Weston Common (Middle Hill) was discussed between councillors, the owner Mr. Lawes, and the Gordano Valley Project Officer of the Avon Wildlife Trust, Mr. Simon Barker. The provision of management plans for common land is the subject of a forthcoming Act of Parliament, and concern has been expressed at the overgrown state of the common, a valuable limestone grassland habitat.

It was agreed that Mr. Barker should be invited to speak at the Annual Parish Assembly in April, after which the Parish Council would establish a committee to consist of representatives from the council, the owner, Avon Wildlife Trust and interested parishioners.

Best Kept Village Competition. This event will again be judged in June and July. Last year the village as a whole gained second place, and Sarah Borland was highly commended for her poster design.

The village orderly, John Curtis, has made great inroads into the debris of the winter. Now is the time for the rest of us to start making sure that in 1988 we do even better.

Future Meetings. Parish Council meetings will be held on:

30th March 25th May 22nd June 3rd August

All these meetings are open to the public, and as usual time will be set aside at the start for parishioners to raise matters of concern.

ST. PETER & ST. PAUL

A unique feature of our Parish Church is the Medieval Palm Gallery in the porch. This will be used at our special Palm Sunday Service on March 27th at 6.30 p.m. On Good Friday there will be a Devotional Service at 12 noon and on Easter Day the Parish Communion at 9.30 a.m. and a Festival Evensong at 6.30 p.m. Sister Lydia, of the Community of the Sisters of the Church has been licensed by the Bishop as a Lay Minister within our United Benefice. She is based at St. Gabriels Dial Hill Road Clevedon and will be helping sometimes at St. Peter & St. Paul.

By the time you receive this we shall have held our Annual Parochial Church Meeting. The Church Wardens and P.C.C. Members are elected at this. At its last meeting the P.C.C. approved our Church budget for 1988. A large increase in our Diocesan Quota (to off-set an under-assessment in the last two years) means that our church will require an average income of £54 per week - an increase

of £18. This includes almost £10 per week on churchyard upkeep. We much appreciate the grant received towards this from the Parish Council of Weston-in-Gordano and North Weston.

A review has been taking place of the Parishes churches within our Deanery. The provisional conclusion in the case of St. Peter and St. Paul was that the church building was 'suitable but not essential'. This view takes into account the cost of maintenance and insurance, the attendance and the proximity of other churches. The P.C.C. were unanimous in asking that this assessment should be reconsidered, bearing in mind the increased attendance and the more active involvement of parishioners in the life of the church. This does mean, however, that the continued existence of our Parish Church cannot necessarily be taken for granted.

Looking ahead on Sunday, May 8th we are invited to the Annual Rogation Service and Procession followed by tea in the Village Hall. There will be no service at St. Peter and St. Paul on that day. From May 14th to 15th we are having a World Wide Church weekend with two visitors from Tanzania. One of them will be preaching at St. Peter and St. Paul on May 15th at 6.30 p.m., and on the previous evening there will be a Tanzanian Evening, including supper in St. Mary's Hall, Clevedon. Tickets will be on sale £2 adults, £1 young people. Finally all our parishes are combining for a visit to Wells Cathedral on Saturday June 4th. This is suitable for all ages, the coach will pick up in the villages at 9.40 a.m.

VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

As well as looking after the general administration of the Hall, the Committee has responsibilities for maintenance and general development of the Hall as a Village Amenity. Recently short-, medium- and long-term projects have been under discussion. Within the very near future, to comply with new Safety Regulations, circuit-breaking devices will be installed in the power circuits, and interior decoration work started.

In the medium-term, it will be necessary to improve the toilet/entrance part of the Hall, when it should be possible with an extension to incorporate the kitchen in this same area, so giving a slight increase to the existing main hall floor space. Looking even further ahead in the long-term, ultimately it is hoped to be able to extend the far end of the hall to provide even more floor space and possibly a stage/storage area.

The coming A.G.M. is scheduled for April 28th, when following the Constitution, the whole of the Committee leaves office and a new committee has to be elected by all those present. This is also an opportunity for villagers to ask questions and make suggestions or criticism, all of which are valued by the Committee who are always anxious to ensure that the Hall is being run and used as the village in general wants it to be.
