



Welcome to Rosemary and Derek Menary who have moved into No.1, The Close, and welcome back to Sybil and Norman Hawken after some months' absence.


Pumpkin Contest - Some plants are still available from Cliff Biddle or David Lewis.


Well done everyone else that took part and especially the ones who had been on holiday and had to pay a forfeit for putting on weight"

## PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

At the Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council, Cllr. Bill Williams was re-elected Chairman and Cllr. David Lewis vice-chairman, for the forthcoming year.

### B3124 Road Improvement Scheme

The compulsory purchase procedure pursues its ponderous way forward, and it is hoped that a date will soon be set for the inevitable Public Local Enquiry.

### Tipping

Your council continues to suffer from a lack of cooperation from the District and County Councils in the matter of the tip. It had been hoped that Woodspring might take up the cudgels on behalf of the village and take enforcement action against the artificial prolongation of the life of the tip by the removal of peat to cover the adjoining Local Authority site. It now appears that the District, like Avon, have no stomach for the fight.<sup>3</sup> fight.

Meanwhile representations continue to be made in respect of apparent breaches of licence conditions such as the mud carried onto the main road during the spring.

### Footpath across Weston Moor

The final pieces of evidence in support of the existence of a footpath from Weston Drove along the Valley to link with the path from Toggart Stile have now been collected, and legal notices will soon be served on the relevant landowners.

### Size of the Council

Councillors have been concerned lately that, on a council of five members, one of whom has suffered a long illness, and another who is occasionally away from the village, meetings have been held with the bare quorum of three present. This means that, in a vote, the opinion of a mere two councillors could prevail, which is clearly undesirable. Decisions have, in fact, been postponed until a later meeting when attendance might be better.

Preliminary discussions are being held with Woodspring D.C. with a view to increasing the size of the council to seven. Should this prove to be impossible, another proposal is to

form a General Purposes Committee to conduct much of the business of the Council. This committee would include all five council members, and two co-opted members.

### Middle Hill Common Management Committee

The first meeting of the newly formed Common Management Committee took place in May, and a report appears elsewhere in this newsletter.

### Best Kept Village Competition

This event is upon us once again, and it is hoped that villagers will feel spurred on by last year's relative success (we were second in our class) to aim for even better things this year. The Parish Council is doing its part by organising the efforts of the village orderly, John Curtis, who has done a first class job in tidying up many of the public parts of the village. Now it is up to the rest of us to make sure that our own small corners are presentable. Quite apart from the competition, it will make the village an even more pleasant place to live through the summer.

### Future Meetings

Meetings will take place on August 3rd, September 7th, October 5th, November 2nd, November 30th, and if you can bear the thought, January 4th 1989.

All meetings begin at 7.30 p.m., when time is made available for members of the public to ask questions and raise matters of concern. All meetings are open to the public.

### MIDDLE HILL COMMON MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

What is a common? Doesn't it, sort of, belong to everyone? You can go there and have a picnic, fly your kite, take the dog for a walk, that sort of thing, can't you?

That's what I thought until I read the Open Spaces Society's publication "Our Common Right", which opened my eyes to a number of surprising facts. I don't propose to pass them all on to you - not here, anyway, because there isn't space. But the most important is that commons do belong to someone, and it isn't you and me. Moreover, some 80% of them

are not even legally accessible to the public.

My interest in the subject began when I noticed that the character of "our" common (Middle Hill - just head up Hill Lane and keep on going) had changed rather drastically even in the short time I have lived in the village (nine years come August!) What was once principally one long sprawling grassy bank, rich in wild flowers and frequented by butterflies and other insects, was beginning to look like a giant blackberry plantation.

This realisation coincided with the receipt by the Parish Council of the Open Spaces Society's document, and talk in local circles of a forthcoming change in the law. This change is good news and bad news. The good news is that the public are likely to be given a right of access to all common land - in many cases for the first time ever. The bad news is that local councils are to be charged with the responsibility of devising management plans for the commons within their areas. Cutting the story short, your council in their wisdom have entrusted me with the chairmanship of a Management Committee for Middle Hill, in an attempt to be ahead of the law for once, and to try to arrest the takeover of the common by those football hooligans of the British flora, brambles and bracken.

The other good news is that "our" common is actually owned by an enlightened and interested landowner, Mr Martin Lawes, who is a member of the Management Committee. Without his cooperation, in the present state of the law, the committee might as well pack up and tend their own gardens. We are also fortunate to have the help and support of the Avon Wildlife Trust, at present through the Gordano Valley Project Officer Simon Barker, and on his departure to the Wye Valley through local naturalist Bill Dixon.

Other committee members are John Howard, a "commoner", which means he is one of two local people who have the right to graze the common; Margaret Hunt, Gail Williams and John Curtis. At present plans for managing the common are not far advanced; we are working on recording the existing state of the area so as to provide a baseline for comparison as work proceeds. No physical work is likely before the

autumn, and even then it is not proposed to plough up the whole area and alter everything beyond recognition. The priorities are to stop the encroachment of coarse overgrowth which is blotting out the present limestone grassland vegetation, consisting of wild vetches and other small flowering species. These are valuable for their own sakes and also for the animal species which feed upon them.

In the past twenty years, one species of butterfly has disappeared completely from the Gordano Valley, (the Chalkhill Blue). Another, the Adonis Blue, has not been recorded since 1983. Two other members of the same family, (the Brown Argus and the Small Blue), live in the same limestone grassland habitat, and it is this diminishing stock of wild flora and fauna which we wish to preserve on Middle Hill.

Watch this space for further progress reports, and be ready to report for duty in the autumn when we hope to organise working parties to undertake the actual labour of pushing back the vandalising vegetation. It could even turn out to be fun.

#### COUNTRYMAN'S DIARY



##### Middle Hill Common

Middle Hill supports one of the largest local colonies of the Marbled White Butterfly and these should be appearing in July. Indeed July should be a good month for butterflies on the common. Look out for Common Blue and Brown Argus, and if you are lucky, Small Blue butterflies. The food plants of the

Common Blue (Birds Foot trefoil) and Brown Argus (yellow Rock Rose) will be in flower as will be the Ox Eye Daisy which the Marbled White butterflies like to settle on. Other interesting flowers in July will include Quaking Grass, Blue Flax, and Wild Scabious, amongst a host of species flowering at this time.

Weston Moor There should still be good numbers of Southern Marsh Orchids flowering on the top part of the A.W.T. Reserve and Twayblade Orchids in the reed bed section of the

reserve. Interesting species of birds nest in this area. In the reeds look out for Reed and Sedge Warblers (although they are difficult to see hiding in the reeds) and often sitting on the Sallow bushes you may see male Reed Buntings characterized by their black head and monotonous song. Butterflies to see here include the Small Heath and Small Copper.

Weston Bigwood - Most of the woodland flowers are over. In the Ride there are over 100 species of flowers, a mixture of wasteland colonisers and woodland plants. There are good numbers of young birds around and you may hear if not see young Green Woodpeckers and Tawny Owls.

Walton Common A lot of Rockrose should be in flower. This is a good area to see the Purple Haintreak butterfly flying around the stunted oak trees in the middle of the Common although July is getting a little late for this species.
