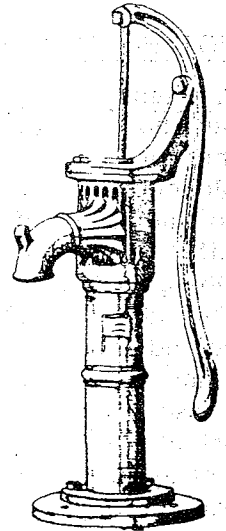

Scrum

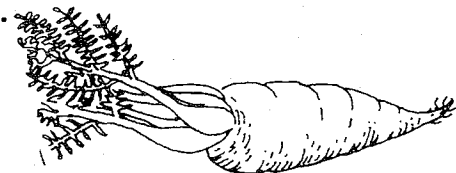

By August you will have a sunflower to be proud of and know that for every inch it has grown you will have helped make money for a really deserving cause.

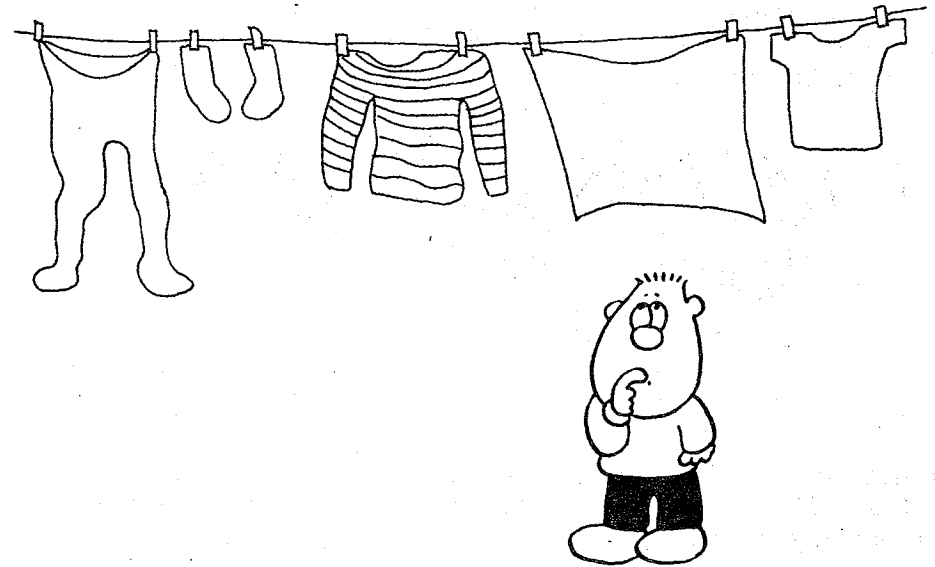

NIGHTINGALE VALLEY W.I.

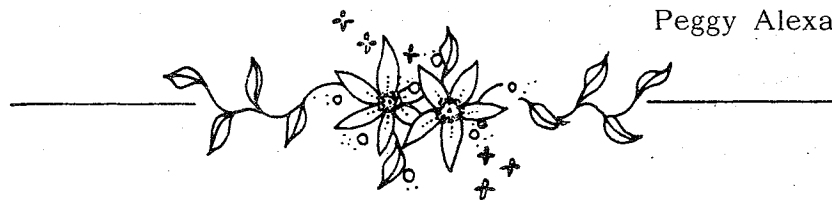

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Black Rock Quarry

Wessex Water have reported that drainage from the quarry eventually finishes up in the Gordano Valley. They therefore recommend that no waste be tipped in the quarry which could give rise to pollution. Avon C.C. have still to make a decision on the request for Planning Permission for tipping on this site.

Cadbury Lane Planning Appeal

Mr. Hill's appeal against the decision by Woodspring D.C. not to allow two houses to be built in Cadbury Lane was upheld by the Inspector from the D.O.E.

Pavement between Hill Lane and Westfield

Woodspring D.C. have been repeatedly asked to put this pavement into a good state of repair. Eventually, they agreed to meet our representatives, and after examination of the pavement, they accept that repairs are necessary and will do the work in April (1989).

Woodspring - the Future

This document lists Woodspring D.C.'s suggested strategy for

promoting the business and leisure aspects of the district. Generally, it was agreed to recommend the following:

1. All proposals should be examined separately on their merits
2. No development on greenfield sites.
3. Infrastructure to be in place before development starts.
4. A drive in entertainment centre was not desirable near to the M5/Portishead interchange.
5. Better roads are required from Portishead and Nailsea to Bristol.
6. The Metro scheme be supported.
7. An Industrial Heritage Centre at Nailsea be supported.

Police H.Q. Liaison Committee

The Council was represented on 6th February at the 1st meeting, from which the following emerged:-

1. Building work will be done in 4 phases starting in Sept 89 with completion due in September 98.
2. High security fencing would surround the site.
3. We requested that contractors' traffic should not pass through Weston-in-Gordano.
4. Traffic to the site would use Valley Road.
5. Attention would be given to landscaping and preservation of existing wildlife.

Footpath from Weston Drove to Weston Moor

Avon C.C. have not yet reported their ruling as to whether or not this will be adopted as an official footpath.

Avon C.C. Waste Disposal Plan

The following main recommendations were made to Avon C.C. after discussion of their weighty document:

1. It is considered that the subject has not been examined as critically as it merited.
2. There should be more segregation of waste at and before collection, to reduce the amount of tipping space required, and to encourage material reclamation.
3. More use should be made of incineration, together with

heat recovery and possible electricity generation.

4. Raw or partially treated sewage should not be discharged into our coastal waters.
5. Industrial companies must be encouraged to treat their own wastes on their sites.

Avon Local Councils Association (ALCA)

The main highlights from the March meeting were:-

Village Halls & VAT - As from 1st April 1989 an EEC ruling makes village hall committees liable to VAT, because they are not classed as charities (although efforts are being made in Parliament to change this ruling). Parish Councils are ruled as charities and do not pay VAT, and it was suggested that village halls could be transferred to their ownership to prevent payment of VAT, whilst leaving the village hall committees to continue their management.

Agricultural Holdings - Development In June the Weston-in-Gordano delegate proposed that "All agricultural buildings be excluded from permitted development rights under Town and Country General Development Order 1988". This was overwhelmingly supported, and if adopted would mean agricultural holdings seeking planning permission for any development in the same way as other householders etc. It was reported that this motion had moved up the National pyramid, and is now being presented to the Secretary of State.

COUNTRYMAN'S DIARY

The very mild conditions in January and early February have caused some unusual occurrences in the Valley. By the 14th February I had recorded 30 species of wild flowers including Wood Violet, Celandine, Primrose, Anemone, Coltsfoot, Buttercup, Barren Strawberry and Pink Campion.

Birds too have been confused by the weather. A Robin was sitting on eggs in Bill Ing's garage by the 3rd February and Cliff Biddle heard a Chiffchaff - (a small brownish warbler which often overwinters with us) singing on the 22nd January.

It will be interesting to see how the very mild winter will affect the various types of wildlife. There have already been reports of many Hedgehogs 'waking up' in the mild weather and some dying of starvation. Hibernating insects such as Lady birds, Aphids, Wasps, Bees should have survived well and there may be large numbers of these insects present later in the year, especially if we have a good summer. Still with insects, look out for Small Tortoiseshell, Peacock, Comma and Brimstone butterflies - they should be waking up from hibernation any time now.

Summer visiting birds should be arriving soon. Here is a brief run-down on expected dates of the commoner ones:

Mid to late March - Chiffchaff and Wheatear

Late March to early April - Blackcap

Early to mid-April - Willow Warbler, Swallow, Reed and Sedge Warblers

Mid-April - House Martin, Cuckoo

May - Swift, the last of our Summer visitors.
