PARISH COUNCIL

Composition of the Parish Council

The Parish Council received approval for the election of 7 councillors in the 1991 elections.

In the elections Ian Borland, David Lewis and Bill Williams were re-elected and joined on the council by 4 new members - Margaret Hunt, Elaine Simons, Judith Stone and Chris Stringer. Mrs. M. Hunt had retired as Clerk to the Council prior to the election to enable her to stand as a councillor. Her place as Clerk was taken over by Robert Hunt.

Bill Williams was elected as Chairman in May 1991 with Davis Lewis as Vice Chairman.

At the September meeting of the Parish Council, Bill

Williams resigned as Chairman because of his pending move from the area and in October, David Lewis was elected as Chairman with Ian Borland as Vice Chairman.

In May, 1991 Cliff Biddle retired after an 8 year spell as Parish Councillor much to everyone's regret. At the Village Annual Assembly in May 1991 Cliff was presented with a tankard to show appreciation of his work to the Council and the Village.

In May 1991 Mrs. Mary McEwan Smith also retired as Woodspring District Councillor for the Gordano Valley, and was presented with paintings, specially prepared by our Village Art Group, at the Annual Assembly. Her support of the Parish Council will be greatly missed.

Maureen Fletcher and Basil Tyler did not stand in May, 1991 but their previous service on the Council will be remembered.

Rates

The Village precept for 1991/92 was set at £1200 - a reduction of 19.35%. This means that the Parish contribution to the Poll Tax was reduced from £6.01 to £4.56.

Farm Tracks in Weston-in-Gordano

Mr. Tyler's appeal against the enforcement notice on the site below Chapel Lane was not upheld at the hearing and the Inspector ruled that the site be cleared of tipped material by March, 1991.

Mr. Tyler's appeal against enforcement notices on 3 other sites in Weston-in-Gordano, one at the end of Weston Drove and one near Conygar Quarry has been partially processed but was postponed due to illness of the Inspector. The hearing is now due on 12 November, 1991 at Weston-Super-Mare Town Hall at 10.00am.

Fowlers Tip and Old Avon C.C. Tip

After pressure from the Parish Council, Avon C.C. finally took measurements of the tipping which had been carried out on the old Council site. These established that the permitted levels on the site had been exceeded. However, Avon C.C. have still not satisfied the Parish Council with any suitable proposed action to remedy the situation.

Article 4 Direction

The Department of the Environment eventually gave approval to an Article 4 Direction to cover the Gordano Valley. This should ensure no works can be carried out without prior proper planning approval.

B3124 Road Improvement

The proposed scheme has now been completed and has resulted in a much improved appearance to the Village and safer walkways for Villagers.

The Council appreciate the funding by Woodspring D.C. and SWEB for undergrounding of cables to improve the environment.

The Council have requested an extension to the pavement on the West side of the Village and a new pavement on the East side of the Village to match the new ones recently provided. Avon C.C. will consider this and add them to their list of future

capital works. However, early provision is not expected.

Middle Hill Common Management

This continues to be managed by Cllr. David Lewis and the Committee deserve great credit for the improvement made to the Common. They were awarded a Certificate for 3rd prize in the 1990 Village Ventures Competition for this achievement.

Planning Applications

Weston Lodge - Conversion of 3 barns to dwellings was approved by the Parish Council and Woodspring D.C.

Weston Lodge Farm - Caravan storage was approved by the Parish Council (majority vote) and after initial rejection by Woodspring D.C. permission was granted for 2 more years.

Squires Cottage, Walton Down - Extension rejected by Woodspring D.C. but granted on appeal.

Moorfarm - A bedroom and bathroom extension was approved by the Parish Council and Woodspring D.C.

Land rear of Court Farm - Conversion of stable to cottage. This was not agreed because inadequate details of the conversion were provided.

Public Right of Way - Weston Drove to Weston Moor Avon C.C. made a Modification Order No 5, 1991 for adding to the Definitive map and Statement this path extending from footpath LA5/19 to LA14/23. This footpath will be known hereafter as LA18/8. To have this footpath adopted required much effort by the Parish Council and villagers.

Footpath - Weston-in-Gordano to North Weston

At the Parish Council's request Avon C.C. stated that they will consider inclusion of a new footpath in their capital programme works. Again, early completion is not expected as there are some 850 works on this programme.

Green Belt Policy

At a well attended Annual Assembly of the Parish Meeting in May, 1991 it was agreed without dissent that the Green Belt Policy should be sacrosanct and no development should be allowed under any circumstances.

Parish Pump Magazine

The Council are delighted that publication will continue.

Information Service

Now this service has been discontinued the Council agreed that Villagers requiring specific information should contact any Parish Councillor who should advise on how this can be obtained.

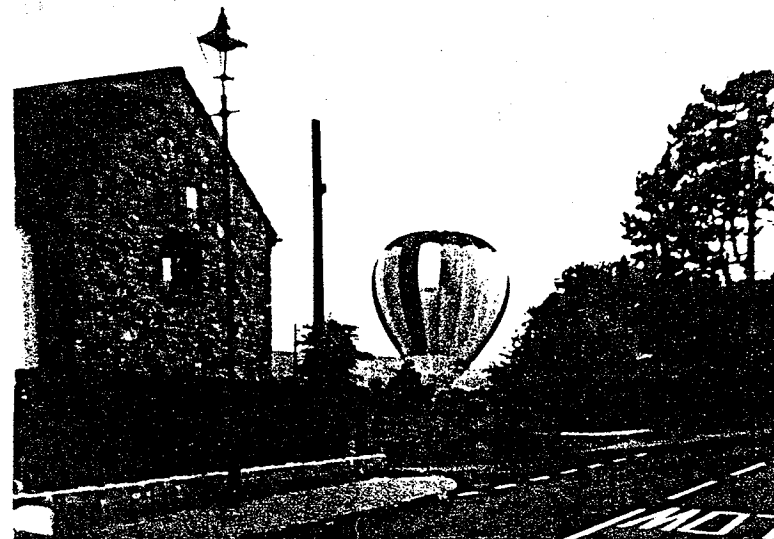
A comment heard in the White Hart last August:

MIDDLE HILL COMMON MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

This has been another busy year on the Common, with Nature doing her best to turn the whole area into an extension of the adjoining woodland, and our gallant band of workers struggling to maintain the status quo.

The battle against the bracken is largely being won, at least on the lower slopes. For three years we have consistently pulled out the fronds as soon as they reach maturity. As predicted, this has depleted the food supplies stored in the root to the point where this normally invasive plant cannot recover. More work needs to be done on the bracken areas higher up, but at least we now know that our labour is not in vain.

More difficult are the ash saplings, which spring up in huge numbers each year and take a lot of digging out. If they are allowed to remain, their shade will kill the delicate wild flowers which make the Common so special.

Our Sunday morning work parties are educational as well as productive, giving a greater understanding and appreciation of the environmental wonders which previously we had missed or taken for granted. We always have expert help on hand, and the work is not too arduous.

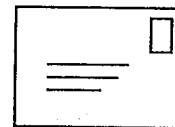
Our dates for the next year are as follows:

Many of you will know of the High Court action which followed the Parish Council election in May. In the election, you, the people of this Village, chose seven councillors to represent you.

Shortly afterwards, the unsuccessful candidate issued writs against four of the new councillors alleging impropriety over the publication of a joint electoral pamphlet. In due course the action was withdrawn, but a hearing in London had to take place and very substantial and unavoidable legal costs were incurred by the four.

It is not appropriate for me to comment on the merits of the lawsuit, or on the reasons why it was brought, except to say that I am quite sure that the four people accused acted in good faith throughout.

There is no glamour attached to the office of Parish Councillor. The parish hall is cold and the seats are hard, and it is easier to lose friends than to gain them, especially when planning matters are under discussion. The Village is fortunate that seven people are prepared to give up their time for the benefit of all.

That the willingness of these four to serve should be rewarded by a financial penalty (and a large one at that) is grossly unfair. Accordingly, I invite all residents of Weston-in-Gordano to donate to a fund to help meet the High Court costs.

The final amount is not yet known, but it is likely to be several thousands of pounds. As a guide, I suggest that £15 from each of the 260-odd electors would be a suitable donation. For some residents this will be too much, and it is to be hoped that some others will be able to give more. Please make cheques payable to "WIG Legal Fund", and send them to me at Old Pound House.

Finally let me stress that this is a personal appeal, which is being launched without the prior knowledge of the four councillors concerned, and that the matter has not been discussed by the Parish Council.
