

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

To sum up previous events, Robert Fowler had appealed against action taken by Avon County Council to curb his use of a sorting/grading plant at his tip site. The appeal was heard at Avon House during 3 days in May. Members of the Council gave up a great deal of their time and put considerable efforts into producing evidence against Mr. Fowler's appeal. The proceedings appeared to go well from our (laypersons) point of view. The date of the result is not known, but it is expected in a few weeks time.

A planning application was lodged for the conversion of the Dairy at Church Lane to a dwelling house. This building is in the Green Belt and the Council have recommended that if permission is granted, the building be tied to agricultural use, i.e. a working farm house.

The Statutory Annual meeting of the Council was held on 5th May, at which Ian Borland was elected as Chairman, and Chris Stringer as Vice Chairman. Grateful thanks are due to David Lewis for his untiring efforts during his Chairmanship.

The Annual Assembly was attended by a greater number of parishioners than for many years. An interesting debate on the policy regarding the recommendations of Planning Permission approval in the Green Belt was heard. A straw poll at the conclusion revealed that of those attending a considerable majority agreed that although permission would NOT be recommended under normal circumstances, each application should be considered on its merits.

The Council has experienced some difficulties in recent months through the lack of a Clerk. However, we are delighted to report that Grahame Tanner has now been appointed as Clerk, and we consider ourselves lucky to have such an able officer.

A number of parishioners have brought to our notice the recent parking problem on the new footpath near Silver Street. This has caused some damage to the paving and has caused some inconvenience and danger to pedestrians. The parking was the result of building work in the area, which has now been completed. We have written to the builders asking them to make good any damage.

VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

Our A.G.M. was held on Tuesday, 27th April, and was well attended, some 20 villagers being present.

Chairman, Geoff Williams conducted a lively meeting with plenty of contributions from the floor. He explained in great detail the revised plans for the proposed extensions, and all present were able to examine the plans as they were posted on the wall. Application for grant and funding has now been made to Woodspring District Council through the good officers of the Parish Council, similarly application for Planning Permission for the extension has been made.

On the financial side Mrs. Nethercot presented a healthy balance sheet, but in view of the increased costs, particularly the hall insurance premium, it has been agreed that with effect from 1st May the hire fee will be £2.00 per hour for villagers and village organisations, and £3.50 per hour for those hiring the hall from outside the village.

Your hall officers and committee for 1993/94 are listed separately, and we welcome on to the committee Mr. Ian Borland, representing the Parish Council, Mrs. Alma Youde representing the Social Committee, and Mrs. Janet Bull representing the Parochial Church Council.

THE HISTORY OF YOUR HOUSE : A GUIDE TO DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE

PART I

There are 8 listed buildings in our village, but a house doesn't have to be listed to have age and history. You may have a new house built on the site of a much older building. Perhaps your new house has architectural features from older buildings.

An obvious start is to look at your title deeds; if these are originals then your search is made that much easier:

Documentary evidence is sometimes difficult to come by, and even when there's plenty of it, it is sometimes hard to link it to a specific property. Larger houses and those with special uses like public houses and blacksmiths are often easier to trace. Houses which are isolated or have unusual names are as well. Remember, however, that many house names are Victorian inventions.

Apparently my Olde Thatch was once called Pear Tree Farm, but even that hasn't helped me in my quest. Properties which have been converted from ancillary buildings will be unlikely to have their own deeds. My previous home dated back at least to 1400, but it had been a military building - a gatehouse to a castle - so the deeds only dated back to 1963 when it was converted to a residence.

You may be able to identify architectural features by reference to such organisations as the Vernacular Architecture Group and the Somerset and South Avon Vernacular Building Research Group,(i), which have surveyed and described with plans and photographs over 1,650 houses in the pre-1974 county of Somerset.

Your primary source material will be maps. You should be able to pinpoint your house or its site and the date of the construction of your property.

In the next issue of the Parish Pump I will deal with the various maps that are available at the Taunton Records Office for the Weston In Gordano area.

STRAWBERRY FLOAT

135g Packet Strawberry Jelly
150ml Boiling Water
450ml Milk
 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 200g packet marshmallows

What to do:

1. Dissolve the jelly in the water, allow to cool. Just before setting whisk in the milk.
2. Chop some of the marshmallows and stir into the jelly, pour into wetted jelly mould. Leave to set.
3. Turn out, decorate with remaining marshmallows.

Be very careful with the boiling water, get an adult to help you!




PUMPKINS
