

VILLAGE HALL NEWS

As I write these notes we await the decision from the Planning Department of Woodspring District Council regarding our application for planning permission for the proposed extension.

At our last Management Committee meeting Mr. Paul Simons very kindly presented a list of essential maintenance works required on the structure of the hall. It was agreed that these jobs being long overdue should be put in hand immediately, to refurbish the existing building, preparatory to the construction of the proposed extension.

Paul kindly agreed to co-ordinate the work with volunteer labour from the village, and so on Sunday morning the 5th September a crowd of willing villagers assembled armed with a variety of tools and appliances. 3 hours or so later two truck loads of rubbish cleared from the side area of the hall, together with cut down overhanging tree branches were removed from the site. The morning's efforts earned the workers refreshments in the shape of beer and sandwiches!! Last Sunday, the 19th, saw a smaller turnout, but with less to do it worked well, with the ladies, Fay and Ann, digging and the men, Paul and Alan, wheeling the barrows. Sundays, 3rd and 17th October, and thereafter by arrangement depending on progress.

PARISH COUNCIL

The last few months have been relatively quiet in Parish Council terms - no meeting was held in August. The main points of recent interest are as follows :

Road "Improvement". It is apparent to all that the 'priority' system is not working. A list of shortcomings which we sent to Avon County Council was treated, we feel, with disdain. However, Phil Hodgkinson managed to get the Council Engineer responsible for the scheme to attend a meeting on site during the evening peak traffic flow. He seemed visibly upset by the difficulties which occurred on the road at that time. He apparently accepted various suggestions for improvements which include reversal of the priority system, further narrowing of the 'narrows' so that passing cannot take place, and further measures to generally reduce traffic speed on the approaches to the priority system. We still await positive action however.

Footpath Enquiry. The Public Enquiry into a footpath along the bottom of the valley was recently held at Walton Village Hall. A number of villagers attended to give evidence on previous usage of the path. The land-owner (Mr. Fowler) appeared to have employed apparently high powered legal assistance; as a Council and Village we were not able to run to such expense. However, many thanks are due to those who attended and provided valuable evidence. The result is awaited with interest.

Tipping. Operations at Fowler's Tip are reported to have been fairly quiet over the Summer months (at least in terms of traffic movement). The large bunds which have appeared on the tip have been perplexing many of us. We have asked the tip operator, as a matter of curiosity, what their purpose is, a reply should be to hand shortly.

MIDDLE HILL COMMON

Don't be alarmed at how bald parts of the Common have suddenly become. It is the result of the labours of twelve keen volunteers who turned up for the work morning on September 19th to do some urgent management tasks, The Woodspring Task Force completing the job on the following Sunday. The aim is to do what the grazing animals would have done in days gone by, keeping the sward very short on parts of the Common. Already the wild flowers are responding, as we all could see earlier this year when it was a really attractive sight - it will be even better next year! Many thanks are due to all who have helped in this happy task and special mention must be made of Phil Tolerton of the Wildlife Trust who masterminds the project. He not only gives up his Sunday mornings but also comes all the way from Wiltshire to do so.

PART 2 : MAPS

Nothing is ever straightforward in research! I found that out by going to Taunton records office before consulting villagers. If I had, I would have saved myself much time and energy. Apparently half of Weston-In Gordano was not in the parish of Weston-In-Gordano, but in Portishead instead! The South side of Clevedon Road, from the White Hart to the village end (Portishead side) was the piece in question. Unfortunately most records are in Parish files, so doubling the research.

There are 7 types of maps available for consultation : Ordnance Survey Maps; County Maps; Tithe Commutation Maps and awards; Enclosure Maps and awards; plans of proposed undertakings, and maps of highway closures or diversions.

Maps are primary source material which act not only to pinpoint the site of your property in relation to its surroundings, but also to act as points in time between or before which your house was built.

Ordnance Survey Maps are always necessary for nineteenth century buildings. The 6 inch or 25 inch O.S. maps were produced in 1882 - 1888 and published between 1884 and 1890. Revised editions were published between 1901 - 1906. Nothing larger than 1inch scale was published before 1884. They are available for the village.

Other printed maps. Both Greenwood's Map of 1822 and Day and Masters map of 1782 are available. B. Donn's 1769 map of an 11 mile radius around Bristol is also useful. The first two are on a comparable scale to the 1inch O.S., but I was unsuccessful in locating my property on them.

Tithe Maps of 1840. For properties over 150 years old these are the primary sources of information. They are

26.6 inches, 20 inches and 13.3 inches to 1 mile. Remember that the village is on 2 maps. The parishes are mapped to show and number all plots (i.e. fields, houses, etc.) and the accompanying books of apportionment will give owners and occupiers of every numbered property.

Enclosure Maps 1809. The problem with this map is that all houses then standing were probably mapped but not necessarily always numbered, or included in the books of reference with the maps.

Estate Maps. These provide the only map source before 1790. Portishead was mapped in 1740, Weston-In-Gordano in 1741. No separate book of reference is available.

Other Maps.

1. Plans of proposed public undertakings such as railways, canals and turnpike roads. These date from 1791.
2. Maps of highways diversions or closures date also from C1790.

Next edition I'll deal with Taxation and Rating Records.

We did not close for 'holidays' this year, there was always a group (be it small) wanting to meet.

WILDLIFE TRUST IN THE GORDANO VALLEY

On the subject of the Wildlife Trust, a word perhaps is necessary to explain why the Trust was concerned about the Weston Drove Footpath Claim. The Trust generally has an open access policy to its reserves and indeed urges people to enjoy them and the wildlife that lives within them. At certain times of the year, though, such as when birds are nesting, it is necessary to ask people to keep off some areas to avoid disturbance. The Trust also has a responsibility to protect Avon's wildlife. The claimed footpath does not cross Weston Moor but it does go over the neighbouring National Nature Reserve and a NNR is the highest category of nationally important wildlife sites. It also crosses fields where redshank, snipe and lapwing nest - species that are declining nationally and that are very sensitive to disturbance. One person walking nearby will put up the nesting birds and sharp eyed crows are always lurking to take the eggs or young. The Trust recommended to the Inspector that if he found in favour of the claim, a permissive path should be negotiated which would route people away from the sensitive area and which could be closed during the nesting season. It would be a small price to pay to prevent the continuing and dramatic decline in these birds.
